Student Welfare and Support within school

Every member of staff at TMWS, regardless of their role within school, holds a current ERSCB Child Protection (CP) qualification in addition to undergoing annual in-house refresher CP training. This training is invaluable in that it equips staff with an understanding of CP principles, the ability to recognise signs of abuse, harm, neglect, and also the procedure for handling disclosures. If a student approaches any member of staff, they will be listened to, taken seriously, and a set procedure followed. Well-Being Centre - Mrs Bell & Mrs McCall

First Aid/Medical Staff - TMWS



A team of six first aiders provide a duty rota throughout the school week. They operate within the guidelines of our First Aid Operating Procedure and Management of Medicines Policy. All have the St John Ambulance First Aid at Work (4 day) certification and all are experienced in practising first aid. When a student feels ill or suffers an injury at school, they will be treated by one of the team. All visits to the Medical Room are noted on the school's records and accidents are recorded in accordance with Health and Safety legislation. The First Aid staff will monitor Medical Room activity and report any relevant information/occurrences to appropriate members of staff. All medical room records are reviewed regularly by senior leadership and examined periodically by governors.

School Nurse - Helen Maull

Our school nurse works within a team of nurses to promote the health and well-being of school aged children, with individuals, or with families either in school, homes or health centres. She gives advice, support and information about health issues, signposting and supporting students and their families in the accessing of other services. She also provides training and information in school to students with health needs, as well as a confidential 'drop-in' service. Students can talk in confidence about any worries they may have. The 'drop-in' clinic (Wednesday lunch) gives access to a range of information and services. Helen also deals with a diverse range of topics including bullying, difficulties with friendships or relationships, bereavement, young carers and healthy lifestyles.

Safeguarding - Health and Safety/Staffing

Iain Robinson (Business Manager) is responsible for the co-ordination of health and safety/staffing at TMWS, including recruitment.

TMWS follows East Riding and Ofsted standards and guidance when recruiting staff. Any recruitment panel will include school managers and Governors who have undertaken 'Safer Recruitment in Education' training.

Any new member of staff (including temporary cover staff, student teachers and volunteers) is required to hold a satisfactory Disclosure and Barring Service clearance.

On commencing their employment, employees are required to undertake the ERSCB online Child Protection training course 'Awareness of Child Abuse and Neglect' and then receive annual update training as well as INSET sessions.

Keeping Children Safe in Education - September 2020

The DfE has updated and published the "Keeping Children Safe in Education" document which came in to effect from September 2020: [KCSiE Link](#)

The guidance applies to all schools, whether maintained, non-maintained or independent, including academies and free schools, alternative provision academies and pupil referral units. It also applies to sixth-form colleges, further education colleges and relates to children under 18.

Schools and colleges must have regard to this guidance when carrying out their duties to safeguard and promote the welfare of children. The guidance sets out what the school/college should do and sets out the legal duties with which schools/colleges must comply.

Safeguarding Assemblies September 2020

In addition to the themes that are covered on personal development days (PD days) and other special events organised throughout the year, such as reinforcing our Safer Internet Policy we organise two safeguarding assemblies each year.

Over the first 2 weeks back in September 2020/21 Mr Ollett led a series of these assemblies which set out to remind students of the need to seek help when it is needed, who they can contact and ask for help, and particularly our responsibility to support and look after each other in our community. All COVID-19 procedures were also covered in detail.

Students were reminded how we protect ourselves against strangers in school, alongside how and why we make the school secure for them.

They were also reminded of the importance of standing up to bullying and always reporting any behaviour that they feel is directed either towards themselves, friends, or other members of our community. This includes travel on the buses where students can use Buswise to anonymously report concerns.

Students are also reminded of how to keep themselves safe on the internet and the importance of knowing who they are speaking to on social media platforms and what to do if they have any concerns. Mr Ollett stressed that pupils are responsible for their actions when using school ICT and personal technology. Also that pupils should think carefully before they share any information, photos or videos.

We have a safeguarding and CP noticeboard in school with all information, staff roles and contacts.

School Site Safeguarding Updates

The school has continued to make changes to improve safeguarding on the school site over the past 3 years. These measures include gates and fencing around the front of the school to secure the site. Visitors are required to access the school through the front entrance.

The school also invested in fencing for the rear and side of the site. The Beverley Road corner entrance to the field has a gate which is locked during the school day. Pupils will need to exit and enter school via the front reception between 8.45 and 3.10.

Fencing the whole school grounds is the next phase of securing the school site.

The school have created an extended staff carpark at the far entrance which has allowed us to reserve spaces for visitors in the main carpark. This will reduce the amount of traffic parked on Spring Road making it safer and easier to drop off and collect students. Please do take care and park sensibly as buses and taxis take priority in the marked areas.

We use our extended bus lane in the morning, which requires pupils to enter the school premises via the pathway through the gap in the hedge avoiding pupils walking through the school car park.

The main school gates are closed at the end of the day for student safety until all buses have departed.



Right to Be

TMWS continue to be a flagship school for the “Right to Be” project. With pupils and all staff having received training. We have key champions and ambassadors in the student and staff team. The Right to Be Project aims to support:

An increased awareness and knowledge of what a hate crime, its nature is and the impact of a hate crime on the victim, perpetrator and the community - increasing empathy for others.

Increase resilience, positive mental health and well being in communities.

The development of professional networks, liaison, and partnership working - with the Council, with Humberside Police and local secondary schools to tackle sexual and trans identity hate incidents and hate crimes.

Victims of hate crime have increased confidence to report a hate crime, seek help and support in their community.

A sustainable and embedded model which can be maintained by trained Champions and Ambassadors who have improved skills to support their local service users/community members to respond and tackle hate crime.

Bus Wise

If a student (or parent) becomes aware of an incident occurring on the school bus about which they are uncomfortable or which they feel should not be happening, they are encouraged to contact Buswise. This is an initiative run by the school transport section of the East Riding of Yorkshire Council and it provides the means by which such incidents can be reported confidentially and anonymously. Buswise can be contacted by email or telephone. They will note the details then contact Mr Ollett, Assistant Headteacher, at school. Mr Ollett can thereby ensure that all incidents relating to school transport are investigated in accordance with the school's Behaviour Policy. The school and ERYC work together in connection with allegations made this way.

ERYC school transport inspectors regularly board the buses in order to check bus passes and to reinforce to students the consequences of unacceptable behaviour on board. Please follow the link:

Personal Development Days 2020/21

Safeguarding plays an important part of our Personal Development Days. Throughout the year we look at a number of areas which help our students develop. The main thrust of this being PD Day 2 which centres around Safer Internet Day. This year's theme is 'Together for a Safer Internet' which encourages students to consider how they use the internet and how they can help to make it a safer place. As well as looking at e-safety we also study 'British Values', Relationships, Body Image, Respect and Tolerance, which contribute to the development of our students into good citizens. Alongside this we also study themes which prepare students for their adult life including, finance, business, CV Writing, Interview skills, and many more.

Cycle Safety/Scooters

We want to encourage students to cycle to school for the obvious health benefits but we urge parents to ensure bikes are road worthy and your child is wearing a cycle helmet. Most do wear helmets but some don't and, although not law, I would strongly recommend that helmets should be worn. I would also like to remind students that when on school site they should walk with their bike for the safety of other students. Cycle access is through the front pedestrian entrance NOT over the field from Beverley Road. If students are riding dangerously around school they will receive a C3 sanction and a warning that continued dangerous behaviour will result in them not being able to bring a bike onto the school site. The use of scooters continues to be banned.

Well-being

The school now operate a well-being centre housed in the old school youth club. Alongside mentoring and our ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant), Mrs Bell, we have 4 staff trained in youth mental health first aid in Miss Gemmell, Ms Joshi, Mrs Bell and Mrs Brice.

CPOMS

The school have used CPOMS for the 3 years to record all child protection and safeguarding concerns in one central area. All staff have an account and send any concerns to Mrs Brice (CP Co-ordinator) and Mr Ollett (DSL) to be actioned in accordance with our policy.

TMWS Student Council



The Student Council acts as the voice of the student body. It comprises 2 students from each tutor group who have been elected by their peers. They are a link between the student body as a whole and the Senior Leadership Team and Governors. Meetings are held monthly, allowing the opportunity for the students to raise issues important to them and also express their opinions about school matters. This is a vitally important role within school; the Student Council has been the driving force behind several initiatives in school.

TMWS COVID-19 Updates

If your child or anyone in your household has symptoms they must stay at home

Any student who has coronavirus symptoms; a new or continuous cough, a high temperature or a loss/change in your normal sense of taste or smell, should not attend school and you should arrange a test as soon as possible. If you are not able to travel to a test facility we have some home testing kits in school that we can issue.

Your child should remain at home until you have received test results. This also applies if anyone in your household also develop symptoms.

If anyone in school becomes unwell with coronavirus symptoms we will contact you to collect them to go home and arrange a test. Whilst waiting to be collected students will be asked to sit outside if the weather is good or in the school hall on a single chair allowing a 2m distance from others to be maintained. The area will be cleaned thoroughly once the student has left along with any other areas the student has visited including toilets.

Other staff or students who have been in close contact with the individual do not need to go home unless they too develop symptoms.

Arranging a Coronavirus Test

Any member of staff or student with coronavirus symptoms must call 119 and arrange a test on line at:

You should self isolate along with other members of your household until they receive the test result.

If staff or students subsequently receive a negative test result they can return to school if they feel well enough to do so. Members of the household without symptoms no longer need to isolate.

If a member of staff or student tests positive the school should be informed immediately to allow us to communicate with public health and determine if other staff or students will need to self isolate for 10 days from the onset of symptoms. Follow the medical advice on self isolation. Other members of the household need to self isolate for 14 days and get tested if they too develop symptoms.

What happens when someone tests positive?

If your child tests positive you must contact the school immediately. During office hours this should be by telephone and at other times by e-mail or E-Praise message. You can message me directly via E-Praise by selecting Mr R Harrison from the staff list. Please do not contact me over the weekend rather than wait until Monday morning as it will allow us to inform others who may need to self-isolate.

Please do not post your test results on Facebook or other social media as this has created stress and anxiety for other parents whilst awaiting news from the school. We must take advice from Public Health before responding so this can take several hours.

We contact East Riding Public Health who advise if any other students or staff need to self isolate. This will depend on the close contacts of the individual who has tested positive. Close contact are defined as any person who has been within 1m for any period of time above 1 minute, or those between 1 and 2m for more than 15 minutes. Generally staff will be 2m away from students whilst teaching or will wear face coverings if moving around the classroom or school.

We will be able to identify all those individuals through seating plans for lessons, school transport and changing rooms. We would also ask the individual who they had spent time with outside of these formal times in school, ie break, lunch and walking to school etc. This may mean that not all the Year Group need to self isolate, especially with Year 7 and 8 who have almost all lessons in the same group. We are not going to identify any individuals but will identify the Year Group Bubble when students test positive.

Those staff/students sent home to isolate do not need to get tested unless they also develop symptoms. If the test is positive you should inform the school immediately and isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of symptoms and until you have been symptom free for 48 hours. **Household members of those who are sent home do not need to self isolate unless they too develop symptoms.** If you have a child in another school who has been asked to self isolate as a precaution and they DO NOT have symptoms you can still send your other children to TMWS.

If we do have a positive case we will communicate this with all parents and staff without naming the individuals involved. This will be for assurance that all precautions have been taken and confirm any actions that should be taken. We will communicate as soon as possible to allow for any childcare arrangements to be made.

It is likely that there will be further positive cases in any group that are self isolating and it is vital that we are informed immediately as it may mean more students need to be included in the group self isolating.

As cases increase locally there will be more positive cases in school. This is happening across the East Riding and across the country. If we all work together and follow the guidance we can limit the number of times we have to ask students to self-isolate and the numbers needing to isolate each time.

TMWS COVID-19 Updates

Hand washing / Sanitising procedures

Increased hand washing facilities and sanitising points have been placed throughout the school and in every classroom. Students are encouraged to carry their own personal sanitiser for convenience. Students will wash/sanitise their hands as often as possible and as a minimum when they:

- Enter the building
- Before they eat
- After using the toilet
- After using a tissue
- At the start and end of each lesson

Students are supervised washing or sanitising hands on entry to the building and in every lesson. Students enter the school building and wash hands as follows:

Year 11 - PE door to playground - PE changing rooms

Year 8 - Side doors to main corridor - main girls and boys toilets

Year 7, 9 and 10 - Fire door into canteen quad area - Main hand washing zone

If time does not allow sanitiser can be used. If students prefer to use their own sanitiser this should be done under supervision.

Students will be expected to take responsibility for handwashing after using the toilet and before they eat.

Sanitising points are available in the canteen, reception and around the school.

Face Coverings

We are now insisting that face coverings are worn in all areas inside the school building other than once seated in a classroom or whilst eating. This is inline with updated advice for other public places and restaurants.

It is less practical to wear a face covering all day and will inhibit learning to some extent so we are not suggesting students wear face coverings in lessons although if you want them to that will be OK. All students should have a plastic bag in which to place their face covering when not in use so that it can be kept as clean as possible. Hand sanitiser is available throughout the building to be used as required and students are recommended to have their own small bottle for ease of use.

Face coverings must be worn on school transport

Staff will be recommended to wear face coverings where 2m social distancing can't be maintained. This is likely to be when teaching assistants are supporting students for example. Generally teachers will teach from the front with a 2 m distance between them and the students. If a student is having work checked or receiving support from a member of staff it is likely they will be asked to wear their face covering.

ALL students should carry a face covering in school for these reasons.

Maintaining good respiratory hygiene: Catch it, bin it, kill it!

Students should try to avoid touching their face unnecessarily. Coughs and sneezes must be caught in tissues or if none available in hands or arms/elbows. Tissues are available in every room.

Tissues must be disposed of in lidded bins available in each room. Bins will be checked and emptied throughout the day.

Hands should be washed/sanitized after tissue has been used. If students sneeze or cough over a desk or area spreading droplets the area will be cleaned with anti-viral spray or disinfectant. All rooms will have anti-viral spray, cloths and paper towels for cleaning. Those staff/students sent home to isolate do not need to get tested unless they also develop symptoms. If the test is positive you should inform the school immediately and isolate for at least 10 days from the onset of symptoms and until you have been symptom free for 48 hours.

Household members of those who are sent home do not need to self isolate unless they too develop symptoms. If you have a child in another school who has been asked to self isolate as a precaution and they DO NOT have symptoms you can still send your other children to TMWS.

If we do have a positive case we will communicate this with all parents and staff without naming the individuals involved. This will be for assurance that all precautions have been taken and confirm any actions that should be taken. TMWS COVID-19 Updates

Enhanced cleaning routines

A day time cleaner has been appointed to work throughout the school day cleaning frequently used surfaces and toilets. This includes staff and student areas. Along with caretaking staff this has created increased capacity to respond to cleaning requests throughout the day. All classrooms are thoroughly cleaned each evening.

Each room has a anti-viral spray, cloth and blue roll. At the end of each lesson staff / students wipe the desks with antiviral spray along with any other shared equipment. Each practical subject has developed their own routines for shared equipment using technician support to ensure all items are cleaned between lessons.

ICT rooms have anti-viral wipes in addition to the items above so that students can wipe down keyboards and mice at the end of each lesson.

In most cases after a positive case the school will not need to close for a 'deep clean'. We have the capacity to clean all areas the positive case has visited before they are next used.

Student Organisation - Break and Lunch Arrangements

Year groups now have separate breaks and lunches with areas allocated:

Year 7 and 9 have early break and Lunch, periods 2A and 4A on the timetable

Year 8, 10 and 11 have the later break and lunch, periods 2C and 4C on the timetable

Break 2A and Lunch 4A – Year 7 and Year 9

Outside

Year 7 – Upper Playground and outside seating near the gym

Year 9 – Lower Playground including all outside seating in that area

Canteen

Year 7 – Main Canteen

Year 9 – Side Canteen and Outside Canteen

Inside Social Areas/Library

Year 9 - Main (Big Social Area)

Year 7 – Small Social Area (Outside IT3) + Library if available
