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Headteacher Update

We are approaching the end of another school year, with examinations for Year 11 completed our attention turns to Year 10 who are experiencing full GCSE papers for the first time this week before going out on work experience in the first week of July. We are also looking forward to welcoming parents of Year 9 students into school for a parents evening for the first time since Year 7, and it seems we have a trip or activity organised almost every day over the next 3 weeks.

Almost everything is 'back to normal' now in school but COVID is still circulating and we have had several staff and students testing positive since the half term holidays. We still have plenty of test kits available in school if you need any at home. Please do ask your child to take a test if they have any symptoms. They should stay at home for 3 days and we can prevent further disruption.






Setting the Standard for Exceptional Attendance

Ellie has attended every school day since the start of Year 7! (not including COVID lockdown periods of remote lessons) This is an exceptional achievement and shows great resilience as I am sure there have been a few days when Ellie has come in despite a headache or stomach ache. If students are ill they need to stay at home, but perhaps some of those days being at home are not necessary. Every day at school missed, is lost learning. One day off every fortnight equates to 90% attendance but this means half a school year missed in 5 years! In attendance terms 90% is a concern! This will have a significant negative impact on GCSE grades. All students should be striving for 100% attendance.



Introducing- Mrs Breen

Deputy Headteacher—Safeguarding & Wellbeing

I started work at TMWS in January of 2017 on secondment from Beverley High School where I had worked for 25 years. I came to support the school on its improvement journey, reviewing quality assurance and the monitoring and evaluation of teaching and learning. In September 2018, I subsequently joined The Market Weighton School on a full-time basis as Deputy Headteacher and teacher of Geography/PE. I have worked alongside the Senior Leadership Team in driving the school forward resulting in recognised improvements in Leadership by Ofsted in December 2018 to receive our 'Good' judgement for leadership.



In 2021 I took on the Role as The Designated Safeguard Lead working alongside the Schools Child Protection Officer and our Wellbeing Centre. This role is a natural progression for me and an extremely important one that involves, working with the Senior Leadership Team to ensure safeguarding is at the heart of the school ethos and that all staff are supported in knowing how to recognise and respond to potential concerns.

Additionally I act as a source of support, advice and expertise for all staff at The Market Weighton School. Part of this complex role also involves referring cases of suspected abuse to Children's Social Care, and support staff who have raised concerns about a child or have made a referral to Children's Social Care. I work alongside the governing body to ensure the school's child protection policy is updated and renewed annually and that all members of staff and parents have access to it and understand it. This involves providing regular briefings and updates at staff, departmental and governor meetings to help ensure that everyone is kept up to date on latest policy developments and reminded of their responsibilities.

It is a busy role and with the increasing complexities of society today I manage a well-being team that provides intervention for students that need additional support with their mental health and wellbeing. I pride myself in my ability to promote supportive engagement with parents and carers in safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children, including where families may be facing challenging circumstances.

Integrated into this role is also the wellbeing of all the staff who work in our team. I lead a Staff Wellbeing Committee which allows staff to feedback to how we can support them in order for them to feel happy, valued and supported working within our school community. Good staff wellbeing is essential for cultivating a mentally healthy school, for retaining and motivating staff and for promoting pupil wellbeing and attainment, all of these are key aims that The Market Weighton School has a common vision.

The Market Weighton School is a great place to work, with highly committed staff who are prepared to go the extra mile to support all of the students that they teach and care for. The students are a real credit to the school and the local community, they are friendly, caring and conscientious individuals. I see my role into the future as part of this team in supporting all of the staff and students in order for them to achieve in their personal careers and for students to be successful and happy as they start life's journey.

Jubilee Celebrations Charity Donations



We are unlikely to ever again have a platinum Jubilee such was the significance of the celebrations over the half term break. To mark such an historical event Market Weighton Town Council had specially minted coins made and gave one to every child at school in the town.

We held a non uniform day to support our House Charities and School Fund. Every year we choose 4 House Charities. The School Walk is our main fundraising event but students can also donate E-Praise points which we convert at 1point = 1p using school fund.

Langdale - Motor Neurone Disease Association



Motor Neurone Disease is a progressive condition affecting the nervous system. It has no cure and we don't know exactly what causes it. In the UK 6 people die from MND every day. It has been given a higher profile recently by Rugby League player Rob Burrow.

Wicstun - Aortic Dissection Charitable Trust



Aortic Dissection occurs when there is a partial tear in the aortic wall. It is a time critical-medical emergency that without diagnosis and treatment, is often fatal. When diagnosed and treated on time it has a better than 80% survival rate. Those who do survive require specialised follow-up and monitoring.

Burlington - MIND

Geography Field Trips

Year 7s have been visiting the Holderness Coast this week to enrich their geography curriculum. Our East Yorkshire Coast is studied by students across the country, as it features in almost all geography text books. We are lucky that it is on our doorstep and can go and see the erosion processes in action. The period 2003 to 2020 (18 years) produces an overall average erosion rate of 1.41 meters per year for the entire coastline.

If you are in Hornsea for a day out ask your child to explain long shore drift, or why the cliffs at Mapleton are eroding so much faster than those at Flambrough. This is in part what we hope from our 'super curriculum' in encouraging students to visit places and notice the world around them.

Later this term Year 9 and 10 students will be visiting Beverley to complete some urban geography field work. Our GCSE geographers take part in 2 field trips during the course, the other being to Crane Dale in North Yorkshire to conduct a river study and learn physical geography field work skills.

Visit to Burton agnes hall 02/6/2022

Garden Agnes Hall is an Elizabethan manor house in the village of Burton Agnes near Driffield on the East Riding of Yorkshire, England. It was built by Sir Henry Glynthorpe in 1614. It is designed in the style of the older Harman Burton Agnes Manor House, originally built in 1571. Still stands on an original site. Both buildings are now Grade I listed buildings.

I visited the manor to see the Elizabethan manor house's interior. When I first entered I noticed the tall chimney, the big windows, a small pond and the huge size. There were many tapestries and stone sculptures. Because of the manor's size I suppose the owners were very wealthy. I think the house is remarkable.

When I entered the great hall the walls were covered with carvings and paintings. There is also a huge fireplace keeping the room warm. Religion was very important to the manor's owners since the carvings were related to their religion.

The dining room is a nicely furnished room and has a detailed ceiling above the fire place showing anti-catholic pictures.

The large bedroom provided a very romantic look, but was small. The room was decorated in fine fabrics and gave a great feeling.

All the rooms were accessed by a wide oak staircase. The manor's fancy rooms and gardens were used to impress guests and possibly royalty.

Leonardo Da Vinci

WHO IS HE?
Leonardo di Ser Piero da Vinci was an Italian polymath of the High Renaissance who was active as a painter, draughtsman, engineer, scientist, theorist, sculptor, and architect. He was generally known for his paintings such as the 'Mona Lisa' and 'Last Supper'. In the Renaissance he could hold not only as a scientist but also an artist.

WHY WAS HE SPECIAL?
His natural genius covered so many disciplines that he epitomized the term 'Renaissance man'. He applied scientific method to every aspect of his life, creating ground-breaking inventions for his times.

WHAT WAS HIS IMPACT ON ANATOMY?
He dissected more than 30 human corpses (this being totally frowned upon at the time) exploring every aspect of anatomy, recording his findings in drawings and notes. He created sketches of bones, muscles, nerves and internal organs.

WHAT WAS HIS IMPACT ON THE RENAISSANCE AND ANATOMISTS?
Da Vinci revealed the general laws of the human body structure and relationships between organs. In his anatomical drawings he reflected the actual structure of the human body and his ideas of ideal body proportions. He was just of many to come, to display internal functions, respiration and heart functions. He also pioneered autopsies and internal vessels. Da Vinci influenced many, such as Andreas Vesalius, Giorgio Vasari, Benvenuto Cellini and Raphael who drew all of the Renaissance and artists of the time.

Most people were poor and had to live miserable lives and had to work all day in dangerous jobs. They were not allowed to beg for money and would be whipped if caught.


