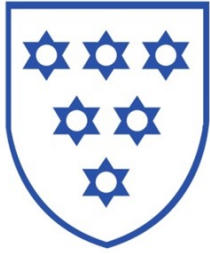

Headteacher Update

The highlight for me this month has been the tremendous support for the Langeland's Snow Ball, raising money to support our student's mental health along with Young Minds and the Nikki Waterhouse Trust. The event was dedicated to the memory of Eden Street, with an emotional message from her mum Debs, that was read out at the start of the evening. We are continually looking for ways to improve the support we already offer and the funds raised will ensure we can do this. As a school we do not receive any funding directly to support wellbeing. We have re-purposed the old Youth Centre building as a base where students feel safe and can seek support when they are experiencing difficulties that might otherwise stop them coming to school.

I also had the pleasure of welcoming Councilor Victoria Aitkin to TMWS this month in her capacity as the lead on Children, Families and Schools for ERYC. She commented on how impressed she was by the lengths we go to, supporting our students, and on the wide range of needs and problems we are dealing with on a day to day basis. We were given credit for this by OFSTED in their recent inspection, but we know we need to do more as the mental health of some of our children is as fragile as ever. With the support of the local community we will be able to continue to offer this support and ensure we can offer positive activities to as many students as possible over the coming year.

Our students have once again been demonstrating our core value of compassion through fundraising for The Royal British Legion and Children in Need. A big thank you to all who donated cakes and sent in cash to help us reach a record breaking £1069 for BBC Children in Need. Our students marked Remembrance Day with a service at the front of the school and a 2 minute silence at 11:00am. Mr Fletcher had delivered assemblies throughout the week encouraging students to wear a poppy with pride. I was also impressed that when we offered the chance to watch the first England World cup game for 100 E-Praise points, I was approached by several students who did not have any points as they had **donated them all** to the charitable causes they support. Needless to say they did not need to worry and were given a pass to watch the game! Our next opportunity to show compassion is our annual Christmas Hamper collection to support the Market Weighton and Holme on Spalding Moor People's Pantry Food Bank.

We introduced our Librarian, Miss Theakstone, in the last newsletter and you will read an update this month which includes some suggestions for Christmas presents. Your support in encouraging your children to read is crucial. As you know we conduct regular reading age assessments and the September assessments showed that a much greater percentage of Year 7 students were reading below the expected level. This was predicted as this group missed crucial time at school in Years 4 and 5 during the pandemic but seeing the stark reality in numbers is still a shock. We found 42% were reading below expected levels compared to a figure which is usually around 25%. The more they read, the quicker that gap will close! On a similar note if you are having a clear out of books that have been read, we would love to have them so that others can read and enjoy them too. We are investing in new books for the Library every month but with growing numbers of students and the need to get them all reading we can't have too many books!

As we end the month Year 11 students are sitting their mock exams and are looking to the future by making applications for Colleges and apprenticeship opportunities. We have a number of events planned before Christmas including the annual 9 Lessons of Christmas Service at All Saint's Church in Market Weighton at 7:00pm on Monday 5th December and the Year 10 Drama group's Christmas Pantomime on Tuesday December. It would be fabulous if you could join us to support our students at these events.

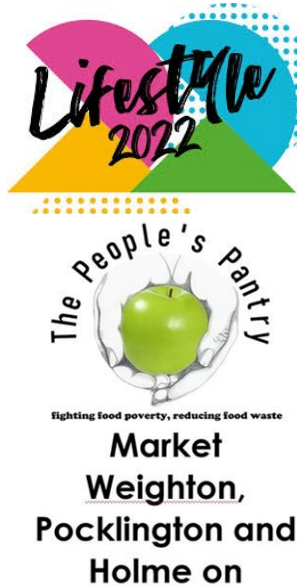

What a fantastic event! Thank you to all who attended and supported this event and to all at Langland's, with a special thank you to James Ducker and the organising committee Sally, Vanessa and our own Mamta Joshi.

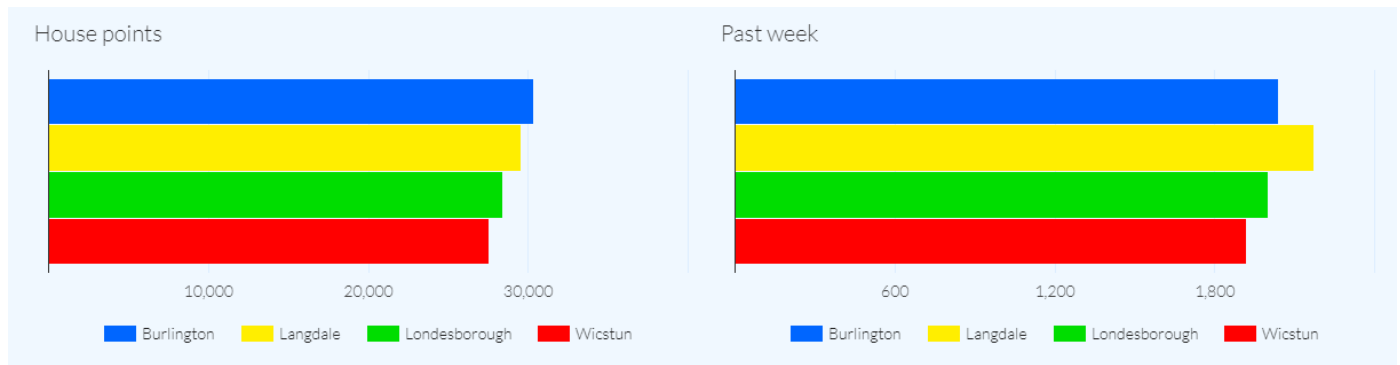
330 guests attended the ball, with a raffle, auction and game of Heads and Tails. We play head and tails in assemblies for those students with excellent behaviour to win a prize, this version with everyone paying £5 to enter raised £900!

Mr Kelly provided the entertainment with his band The Ordinary Men paying his own tribute to Eden who was in his class in Junior School. Mrs O Malley read out a message from Eden's mum Debs, which described how Eden found the Wellbeing Centre a safe space where she could be herself. We have all found the past 18 months difficult when thinking what more we could have done to help Eden but this is nothing to the pain of her family who still have an inquest to face. We saw the Hull Daily Mail were only too quick to link this tragic situation with her time at school. We are humbled by the positive messages Debs has shared about the support Eden received at TMWS and will do all we can to grow this support, seek to train our staff and push for other professionals to get involved when needed. The funds raised at the Snow Ball will allow us to maintain our Wellbeing Centre as a safe space for students at a time when funding is tight.

Schools are looking at massive unfunded cost increases with many, including TMWS reporting projected deficit budgets in 3 years time, some even sooner! As providing wellbeing support is not a statutory obligation of schools we would have to look at the longer term viability of having 2 members of staff there full time and it would have to be closed at least part of the school day. Even with the recent announcement of additional funding for schools it will not cover all the increased costs we are facing, but as a school with enhanced provision for students with additional needs, we are fortunate that we will always have this facility available to ALL our students.

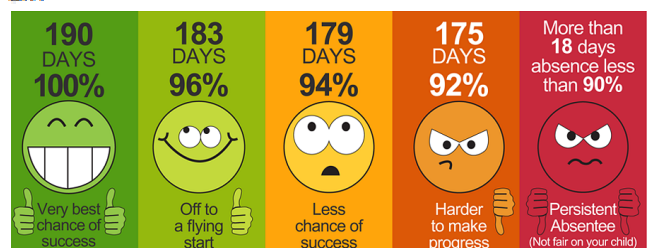

Sickness - Student Absence Recording

Full details with updated advice and guidance on student absences in line with East Riding Council and the NHS can be found on our website.

There is no reason to keep your child away from school for minor conditions such as:

- Acne
- Athlete's Foot
- Cold Sores
- Conjunctivitis
- Hand, Foot and Mouth
- Hay Fever
- Head Lice
- Insect Bites/Stings
- Mouth Ulcers
- Musculoskeletal/Period Pain
- Ringworm
- Slapped Cheek
- Sore Throat
- Threadworms
- Tonsillitis
- Warts and Verrucae



Students missing school for any of the above reasons will be recorded as unauthorised absence.

TMWS Library—Miss Theakstone

We now have over 1,900 books scanned and added to the library's electronic catalogue. The bulk of this is the Accelerated Reader fiction section which means it is now much quicker for students to check out books. After scanning, the books were sorted into alphabetical order and the shelves rearranged so that the books are easier for students to browse.

We received another delivery of new books which are now out on the shelves or already being enjoyed by students.

As part of Non-Fiction November we have also started to sort out the non-fiction shelves. We have been ensuring the books are shelved in the appropriate section before we look at which books are no longer useful. Please see more on this at the end of the Library news section.



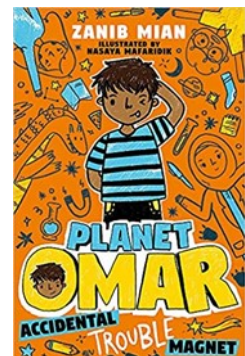
This month in the library we have been celebrating Remembrance Day. We highlighted a selection of fiction and non-fiction books which offer an insight into what life was like during times of conflict and the sacrifices made by those involved.

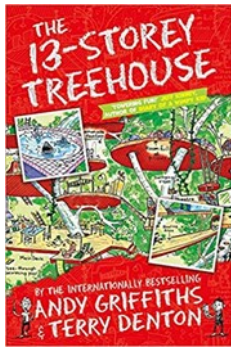
The Accelerated Reader competition has been progressing well and we have awarded our first Gold award for reading 1 million words to Y9 Emily Richardson. We have also given out 2 x Silver, and 27 x Bronze awards. The weekly competition between Y7-9, and within that that Tutor Groups, is being closely fought. At time of writing Year 8 have retained first place for both cumulative word count and books read for an amazing 5 weeks in a row. However Year 7 are gaining on them consistently and Year 9 came top last week for word count progress so are doing their best not to be left behind. The forms in each year with the highest word count are 7JLI, 8RDM, and 9PF. All together Years 7,8, and 9 have read over 11.5 million words this year.

Book suggestions: As Christmas approaches, we thought you might appreciate some book suggestions beyond what you will find on the supermarket shelves:

Accidental Trouble Magnet (Planet Omar) – Zanib Mian

For fans of Diary of a Wimpy Kid this book features hilarious text combined with cartoon-style illustrations to make a very approachable book for more reluctant readers. It follows Omar as he deals with moving to a new house, a new school, and dealing with the school bully in his own imaginative way.



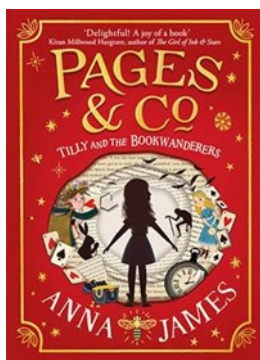
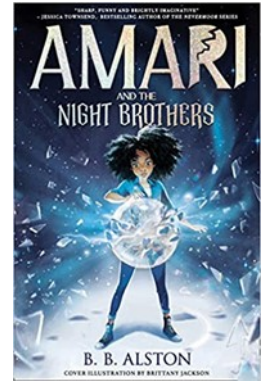


The 13-Storey Treehouse by Andy Griffiths & Terry Denton

This is the first in a series of books which tells the story of Andy and Terry who live in a fantastical treehouse. It follows their madcap adventures and is silly and funny and full of illustrations to capture interest.

Amari and the Night Brothers by B.B A

Amari's big brother has gone missing but no one is talking about it. As she sets out to discover what happened she is invited to the Bureau of Supernatural Affairs where mermaids, dwarves, and magicians are real. Amari must compete against kids who have known about the supernatural their whole lives as she tries to gain a place at the Bureau and search for her brother. For fans of Harry Potter, Percy Jackson and other magical fantasy.

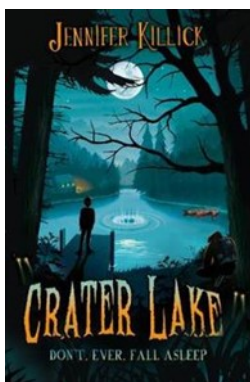
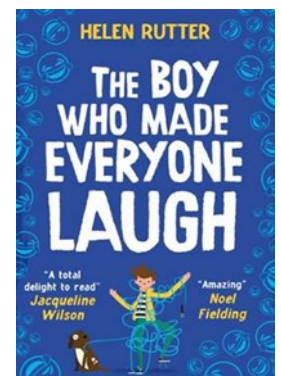


Tilly and the Bookwanderers by Anna James

The first in the Pages & Co series introduces us to Tilly Pages. Tilly absolutely loves books. She has lived above her grandparents' bookshop since her mother disappeared shortly after she was born. Tilly loves to escape into the pages of her favourite stories but she realises that the characters love to escape too – into the bookshop! Great for introducing readers to classic children's fiction as Tilly meets characters like Alice in Wonderland and Anne of Green Gables and discovers she too can 'bookwander.'

The Boy Who Made Everyone Laugh by Helen Rutter

Billy wants to be a stand-up comedian. But first he needs to get rid of his stammer. He is about to start secondary school so he has a list of ways to get rid of the stammer before anyone at his new school notices. Each chapter starts with a joke and the author's real-life experience (his son has a stammer) really shows in Billy's observations of the different reactions to his stammer.

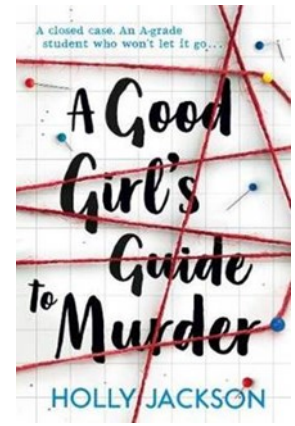


Crater Lake by Jennifer Killick

Arriving at the Crater Lake activity centre for a residential school trip it is clear that something isn't quite right. When the teachers and other students start behaving strangely it is up to Lance and his friends to find out what is going on – and how to stop it. A SciFi/Horror thriller that's ideal for readers who love scary adventure stories.

A Good Girl's Guide to Murder by Holly Jackson

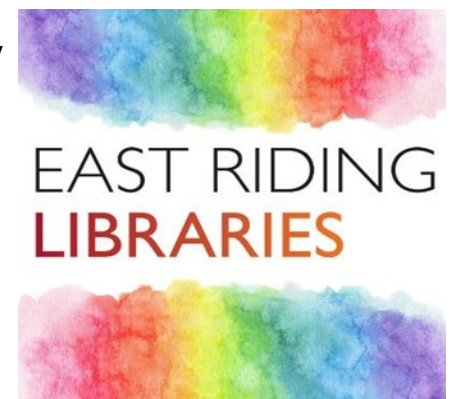
Five years ago a girl in Pippa's village was murdered by her boyfriend Sal, but the body was never found. Pippa doesn't think Sal was responsible and she works with his younger brother, Ravi, to find out what really happened. But the actions Pippa takes to dig up the past put her, and her loved ones, in danger. This book is aimed at fans of True Crime, as is due to be adapted as a TV series.



The Dark Is Rising by Susan Cooper

My final recommendation is a classic work of children's fiction. As Will approaches his 11th birthday strange things start to happen. It never snows on Will's birthday (21st Dec) but this year a blizzard blows in. As Will comes into his powers as an Old One, a servant of the Light, he must collect six signs in order to fight against the Dark. But agents of the Dark are everywhere and the weather keeps getting worse. This atmospheric story takes place over Christmas so is perfect reading over the festive period. For those who prefer to listen the BBC have recorded a radio adaptation. Listen out for it on the BBC World Service or BBC Sounds from 20th December.

Join your local library - Although it would be lovely for every child to receive a new book it can be too expensive for many – especially in recent times as the cost of living increase impacts everyone's budgets. Therefore I would urge you all to sign up your family for library cards. East Riding Libraries offer a range of fantastic services, absolutely free. They don't just offer physical books: you can download e-books, e-audiobooks, even e-magazines. There are thousands of items to choose from, and no late fees for items checked out by children. There is a library branch in Market Weighton and the surrounding villages are served by Mobile Libraries. Once registered, if you only borrow ebooks, you don't need to physically visit a branch

On a stormy little night.

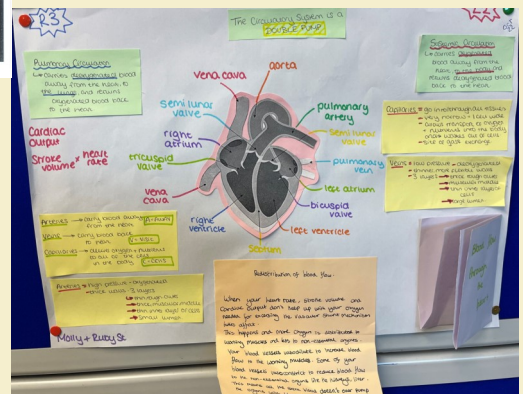
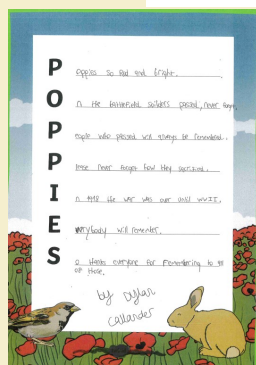
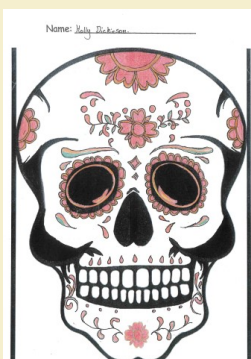
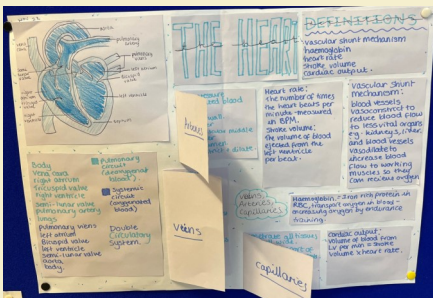
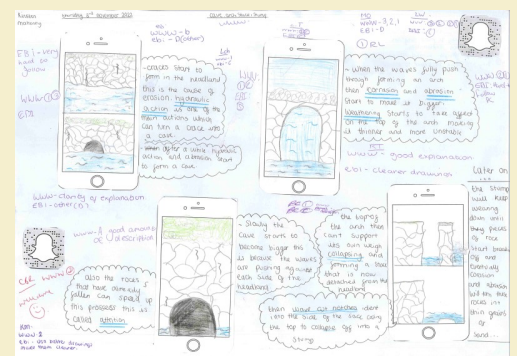
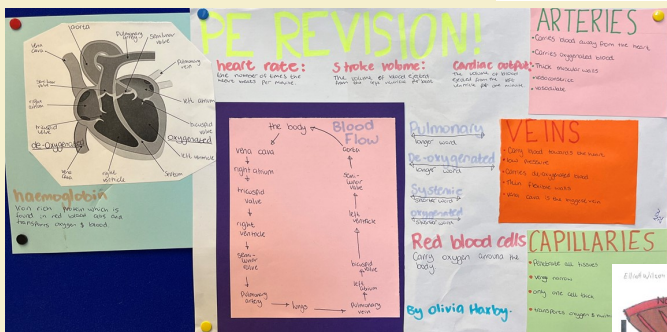
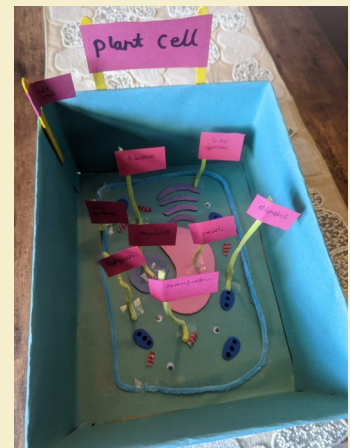
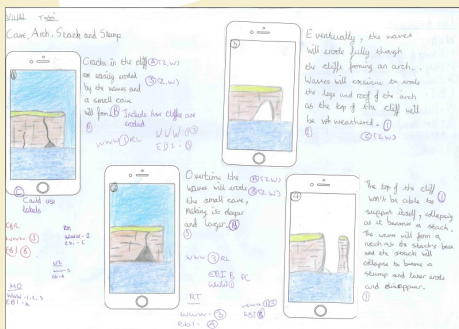


Wall of Excellence - Rewarding 'Industry'
