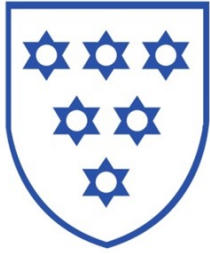

This month has also seen our Year 9 bronze Duke of Edinburgh group complete their practice expedition by walking from Low Catton to Londesborough with an overnight camp in Great Givendale. The D of E Award is open to all students from September in Year 9 when they can start the Bronze award before moving on to Silver in Year 10 and 11. As we watched the Coronation on TV we were reminded of how Prince Philip, the then Duke of Edinburgh set up the Award. The title Duke of Edinburgh has now passed to Prince Edward and he leads on the Award and presents Gold Awards at Buckingham Palace. We were also reminded of the value of volunteering during the Coronation. Activities like D of E and Scouts rely on volunteers and we are lucky to have a growing staff team keen to help make D of E a success.











# TMWS Library—Miss Theakstone

Encouragingly they found that the number of books read had increased by 24% on the previous year.

The TMWS list features many of the authors in the Top 10 nationally. It's based on loans by students in all year groups between September 2022 and April 2023. It isn't a full picture of what students are reading as some students will have their own books from home but it gives a broad view of what is popular. As we add more new books to the shelves we may find authors changing position. For example Alice Oseman's books were only added to the shelves in January but they have already been borrowed enough for her to be the 8th most popular author.

As you might expect each year group has a slightly different list. Chris Priestley's horror stories have helped him appear in the top 10 authors for Y7, David Walliams moves up to 3rd place for Y8s, and for Y9s Liz Pichon is the most popular author. Across the school Humour is the most popular genre, followed by Adventure and Fantasy.

### Accelerated Reader competition news

Since the last newsletter I have awarded two Silver certificates for reading 500,000 words to Jae Smith and Harvey Moran, along with seven Bronze certificates for reading 100,000 words.

Year 7 are still in the top spots for word count and books read. They are now over 5 million words ahead of Year 8 and nearly 10 million ahead of Year 9. At time of writing the top 5 tutor groups for word count are:

# UKMT Junior Maths Challenge—Mrs Carter

The UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge is a national 60-minute, multiple-choice Challenge.

It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are designed to make students think. Most are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience.

We had 4 students achieving a Gold award, 7 gained Silver and 9 with Bronze.

## Free School Meals—Are you entitled?

Your child(ren) will be entitled to free school meals if you as the parent are in receipt of any of the following benefits:

- Job Seeker's Allowance (income-based)
- Income Support
- Universal Credit - Your annual income assessed by the Department for Work and Pension must be less than £7,400. Any pupil eligible for free school meals before 1 April 2018 when the earned income threshold is introduced will retain their eligibility until then end of universal credit roll-out which is March 2025
- Child Tax Credit (but NOT receiving Working Tax Credit) – provided your annual income, assessed by the Inland Revenue, does not exceed £16,190(Please note: this amount is subject to change in April every year)
- Employment Support Allowance (income-related)
- Guarantee Element of State Pension Credit
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.

Entitlement to free school meals is kept as confidential as possible. TMWS has systems has fingerprint identification systems, which do not identify to other pupils the fact that a child is receiving a free school meal.

The free school meal will remain in place for as long as your child continues to attend an East Riding of Yorkshire school and you continue to be entitled to one of the above qualifying benefits.

## Book review:

### The Novice—Taran Matharu

The Novice is the first book in the fantasy series Summoner. It follows the story of Fletcher, a teenage blacksmith's apprentice, as he discovers he can summon demons and begins training at the Vocans Academy.

Fletcher is from a small, isolated village and his lack of knowledge about demons, summoning and even the wider world allows the reader to learn along with him. This allows a gradual immersion into the story rather than suddenly being faced with a complex magical system in the first few pages.

Fans of Harry Potter are likely to enjoy this book with its portrayal of the commoners against the noble students, a teacher with a grudge, and teenagers helping in the war effort. The magic system of abilities and skills will be familiar to readers who have played Dungeons & Dragons or video games with levelling up.

The book can be read as a standalone but the rest of the trilogy has been published so there is plenty more for readers to enjoy.

The groups have to navigate the route learning to find their way without staff support. They carry all they need for 2 days/1 night expedition including tent, sleeping bag and stove. After reaching Bishop Wilton the groups headed up hill, and over to Great Givendale and the Scout Campsite.



This is an amazing spot in a secluded valley. The site has BBQs and a fire pit which we made good use of and as it was Eurovision night we also had a few performances from one of the groups. All enjoyed the roasting of marshmallows on the fire before heading to their

tents.

The groups were up very early and set off before 7:00am on day 2 which took them back towards Market Weighton and the finish in Londesborough. All 3 groups were up and off early showing excellent organisational skills and determination to get finished. We have some very strong groups here and we are looking forward to the assessed expedition in the Howardian Hills in September.

Students can start the Duke of Edinburgh Award in Year 9 with enrollment in October each year. We have a great staff team delivering the D of E Award at TMWS, thanks to all those who came out and supported the students over the weekend.

Hello! We are the Active Travel Ambassadors (ATAs) at #TMWS. We are a group of student volunteers working on campaigns to get more people travelling to school by bike and on foot. After a successful pitch presentation we were recently awarded £250 from Modeshift (a sustainable transport charity) and £250 from East Riding of Yorkshire Council to help carry out our activities.

Already up and running is the **Bike Club** which takes place **every Tuesday 3:10 until 4:10pm**. Students learn practical cycling and bike maintenance skills to boost their confidence. They will have the opportunity to go on a trip cycling around Dalby Forest.

Our upcoming activities are:

### **12th-16th June— Interhouse Walking Competition**

This will be a fun and competitive activity for students. Each day of the week that a student walks to school (or park and strides) they will receive a ticket. All the tickets will be entered into a draw for prizes such as a Fitbit and Amazon vouchers. Students from the house which collects the most tickets will get a go on the smoothie bike.

### **20th and 21st June—Biker's Breakfast**

This activity will encourage people to ride to school via bike. The first 50 who do so each day will receive a voucher for a free healthy breakfast to redeem at school. We hope they will enjoy cycling and do so more often once they realise that the hill really isn't as bad as it seems.

### **21st June—Bike Maintenance Training**

A bike repair workshop will help students learn new skills to repair and maintain their bikes. Many do not travel on their bike because it needs repairs to make it roadworthy. However the most common setback is a simple puncture which is easily fixed. We would welcome donations of bikes for students to fix up and practice their new skills on.

Please help us with our campaign by encouraging students to travel on foot or by bike on the relevant days. If the distance is too far for the whole journey you could drop them off part way so they can park and stride or park and cycle. If you are driving near the school during those weeks in June please be aware that there may be more students than usual on foot or bikes and give them space.

Don't forget the Bike Club every Tuesday afterschool by the bike shelters.

# CALL THE MIDWIFE

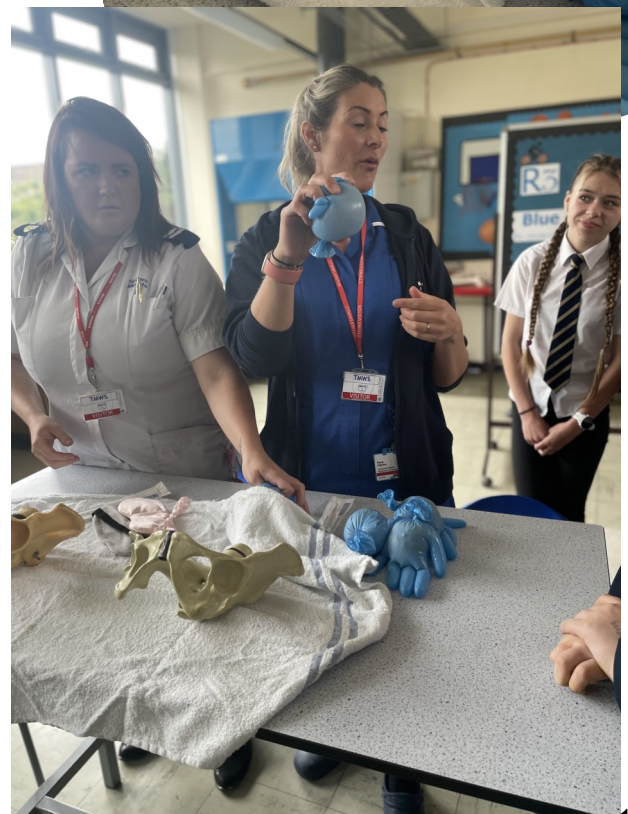
Miss Sutton welcomed Paula (midwife) and Ashleigh (student midwife) to visit our Year 9 and 10 child development classes earlier this month.

## E-praise House Points and Charities

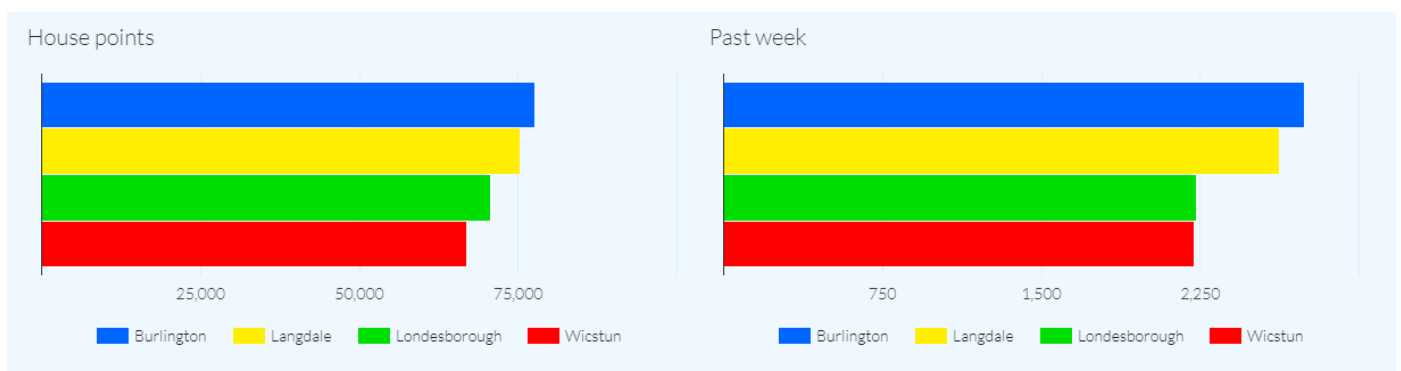

**Write an account of how the slave trade is linked directly to the Black Civil Rights Movement.**

In the early American ages, the Atlantic slave trade was a popular money-making/trading method. Sadly, this included something called the slave triangle which involved trading weapons for African tribal slaves and then brought to America for the slave trade. The "slaves" were black men and women and they were tortured and very badly mistreated. Yet, after being abolished in 1865, all of this left America segregated (not equal races) and gave black people the impression that they were less relevant and got racially attacked. This overall is the stigma that slavery has left over America.

95 years later, the black civil rights movement commenced in 1960, this movement aimed to free America from segregation and racial hatred/bias. Two different types of protests resulted from this, a non-violent protest led by Martin Luther King and a heavily violent protest led by Malcolm X. Martin Luther King's protest included peacefully shouting and patrolling for equality. Yet, Malcolm X's protest aim was to torture and treat white Americans like they did to the slaves in 1776-1865. None of these protests was completely successful yet Martin Luther King's protest is more well-known in comparison to Malcolm X's protest. Although, this could be a result of the different protest types or the fact that Malcolm X was killed before his protest could commence.

In conclusion, the link between the early slave trade and the black civil rights movements in the 20th and the 21st century was that slavery was the reason for both these protests. For example, without slavery, America would have never been segregated, and innocent black men and women would have never been taken away from their homes and brutally abused. The stigma of racial attacks on black people and the overall oppression that was caused by the brutality of their actions and the overall way that slavery was normalised. Laws in America kept it segregated even after it had been abolished. Such an inhumane thing like slavery leaves places like America damaged.

Overall, even when slavery got abolished, segregation existed and this meant that civil rights movements had to commence because if they did not, black people now would probably still be seen as "slaves". Black people had no choice but to protest, their lives and future generations were at risk and all of this was caused by the slavery acts of the early 1800s.

**Write an account of how the Slave Trade is linked directly to the Black Civil Rights Movement of the 21st Century.**

In the late 18th and early 19th century the Atlantic Slave Trade arose. This was a process which exploited humans to do work. These people were taken by boat from Africa and heavily discriminated because of their black skin. But after sometime the slaves had enough. Riots broke out at plantations but these almost always turned out unsuccessful. Slaves also tried to escape the plantations, one of these attempts that were successful was Harriet Tubman who later campaigned for slavery to end.

After years of trial, slavery was finally abolished in 1865, but that didn't mean there wasn't a bad view left on black people. From the downfall of the Slave Trade arose heavy racism and segregation. In school black kids were separated from the whites and black people were seen as inferior. Lots of racial slurs were used because of this and black people were furious. An example of racism is the Montgomery Bus Boycott. During these times if a black person rode by a bus they would have to sit at the back and give up their seats to white people. One lady called Rosa Parks eventually had enough and refused to be discriminated against and part with her seat, for this act she was arrested. From this an uproar occurred in the black community and they refused to use busses and found their own ways of transportation.

You would think that the Slave Trade would be left in the past but it still heavily impacted black people's lives. Because of this two very different people came into the spotlight. Martin Luther King and Malcolm X. Martin Luther King tried to tackle down racism and fought for Black Civil Rights. He approached this in a non-violent way and is still remembered today for his selfless acts of bravery. Yet sadly, for his beliefs he was assassinated but is still known around all around the globe, most notably for his "I had a dream" speech.

On the other hand Malcolm X had a whole other story. He had experienced first hand racism and trauma as a child by the Ku Klux Klan (KKK). Because of this he had adopted a violent approach to battle for change and believed Martin Luther King hadn't been doing enough to get his point across. Malcolm started riots and fights just so he and all black people could live a free life. Similarly he was also tragically assassinated for his beliefs.

Despite all of this which occurred, racism still exists in our society. It has notably been toned down from its original quantity but is still seen in the masses. An example of this is statues of slave owners in big cities that were built on the Slave trade economy. Because of this many people of all races try to knock them down and protest. Another example of modern day racism is the story of George Floyd and how a police officer used excessive aggressive force against him, resulting in his death and uproar in the community.

In conclusion, even after the Slave Trade was abolished it still heavily and directly impacted Black people's lives and changed what they could and couldn't do.

## How Information is Presented at York Army Museum

Information is presented very well and in many different ways at the York Army Museum. These include screens, videos, information sheets and replica items.

Upon entering the museum you are greeted with an array of kids worksheets varying from drawing, to mazes and to even finding specific items in the museum. You are then shown many replica outfits on display with large electronic screens showing the meanings through video, text or photography. As you venture forth into the museum there is a timeline of wars from 1685 - 2015. This shows how wars, tactics, items, weapons and clothing evolved over the last few hundred years. Opposite the timeline is another wall full of interactive activities such as dressing up or testing toy tanks. Upon completion of the timeline there is a miniature cinema room where there is a short film about war playing throughout your visit. As well as the replica items, there are also many real and used items such as a match box with a bullet hole in it.

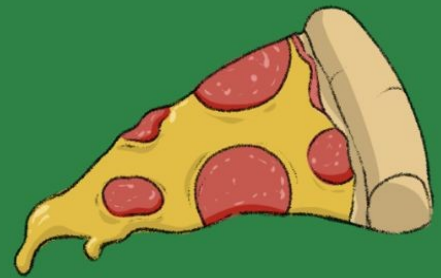
