Headteacher Update

As we end another school year we have a packed newsletter with photographs of all the activities that have taken place in the last few weeks. It has been a hectic half term with trips and visits and has culminated with our annual Awards Evenings and Summer Concert. Students have also competed at Sports Day and in the East Riding County Athletics Competition. Year 11 have marked the end of their time at TMWS with their Prom and Year 10 have experienced a week in the real world of work! These are the events that we missed so much during the COVID restrictions and it is great to have a full calendar of events back as these are the things that children remember from school. It is through taking part in these activities and experiences that our character develops and we learn how to interact in the complex social world in which we live.

These events take a lot of planning and I would like to thank all our staff for the part they play in organising, leading and supporting them. Despite the pressures of supporting industrial action we have maintained a full calendar of events to benefit our students. I am confident that now the government have made a revised pay offer to teachers and agreed to supplement school budgets to pay for it, we will get an agreement and industrial action will end. We can look forward to the Autumn term knowing that it will be free of disruption. We are fully staffed for September with new teachers joining us in maths and English along with 4 new teaching assistants and a new PE apprentice. We are saying goodbye to Mrs Bailey this week as English teacher and cover supervisor after covering successive periods of maternity leave in the department. Mrs Saltmer is also leaving us to train as a teacher having covered lessons for absent staff for several years at TMWS. Miss Goodison is also progressing on to teacher training from her role as a teaching assistant. We wish them all well and thank them for their contribution to TMWS.

We welcomed 132 Year 6 students over our 3 day transition earlier this month and are looking forward to welcoming them all back as TMWS students on Tuesday 5th September. We will have over 600 students in school next term, the largest number for many years. I have included some reminders about behaviour and uniform including equipment in this newsletter to help ensure your child is fully equipped and ready to learn when they return in September. We will be increasing the frequency of our communications with you on the basics of attendance, rewards, consequences and homework to support all of our students to meet the high targets that we set. We took 267 students out on rewards trips this week and hope to take double that number next year! Students get points for attending on time and bonuses for a full week and no demerits. Points are available every lesson and for every homework completed in addition to all the accolades and achievements that students can work towards on E-Praise. Burlington took an early lead this year in the House Cup competition and have lifted the trophy this year, despite Londesbrough being Sports Day winners.

Details of our uniform are available on the school website and have not changed for September. We aim to have limited branded items and most can be purchased at high street shops and supermarkets. Price and Buckland offer free delivery to school and these items will be available to collect on Thursday 24th August and on Monday 3rd September. We have an increasing stock of pre loved uniform that you can view by appointment with our receptionist. Do call us to ask for support if needed, we have items we can lend and will have plenty of skirts and trousers available in September for any students who have persuaded parents to buy inappropriate / non uniform items. Do label all uniform items and if 'lost' ensure your child checks lost property as we have dozens of almost new coats, bags, PE kit and water bottles that are unclaimed.

We will be busy upgrading the lighting throughout the building over the summer in a £150k project and an £80k project will see flood prevention works take place across the site and improved landscaping and tree planting. Both projects have been funded by the school in partnership with East Riding Council. Our site team will be working throughout the summer to decorate and improve other parts of the school buildings ready for our return in September.

I hope you have a great summer and find time to relax and have fun whatever you are doing. Stay safe and we will see all our students back in school on Wednesday 6th September (Year 7 Tuesday 5th September)

Belgium Battlefields—Mr Fletcher

This term forty Year 9 & 10 students took part in a tour of the First World War battlefields and cemeteries in the vicinity of the Belgian city of Ypres. Following the cancellation of our tour in 2020 due to Covid this trip had been keenly anticipated and I feel students and staff alike got a vast amount from the experience.

A 4am start on a Monday morning was a struggle for some students but by the afternoon they were keen to discover our first site, Poperinghe New Military Cemetery. Our guide, Andrew Thornton, took us to visit a soldier local to Market Weighton; Captain George Jefferson Scott. Captain Scott was a bank manager and a member of the Territorial Army whose members were called up following the declaration of war in August 1914. He travelled to Belgium in April 1915 and was a well-liked officer; sadly he was killed on Christmas Day 1915 then taken to Poperinghe. Our subsequent experience was marked by this encounter and pupils were encouraged to think of Captain Scott throughout.

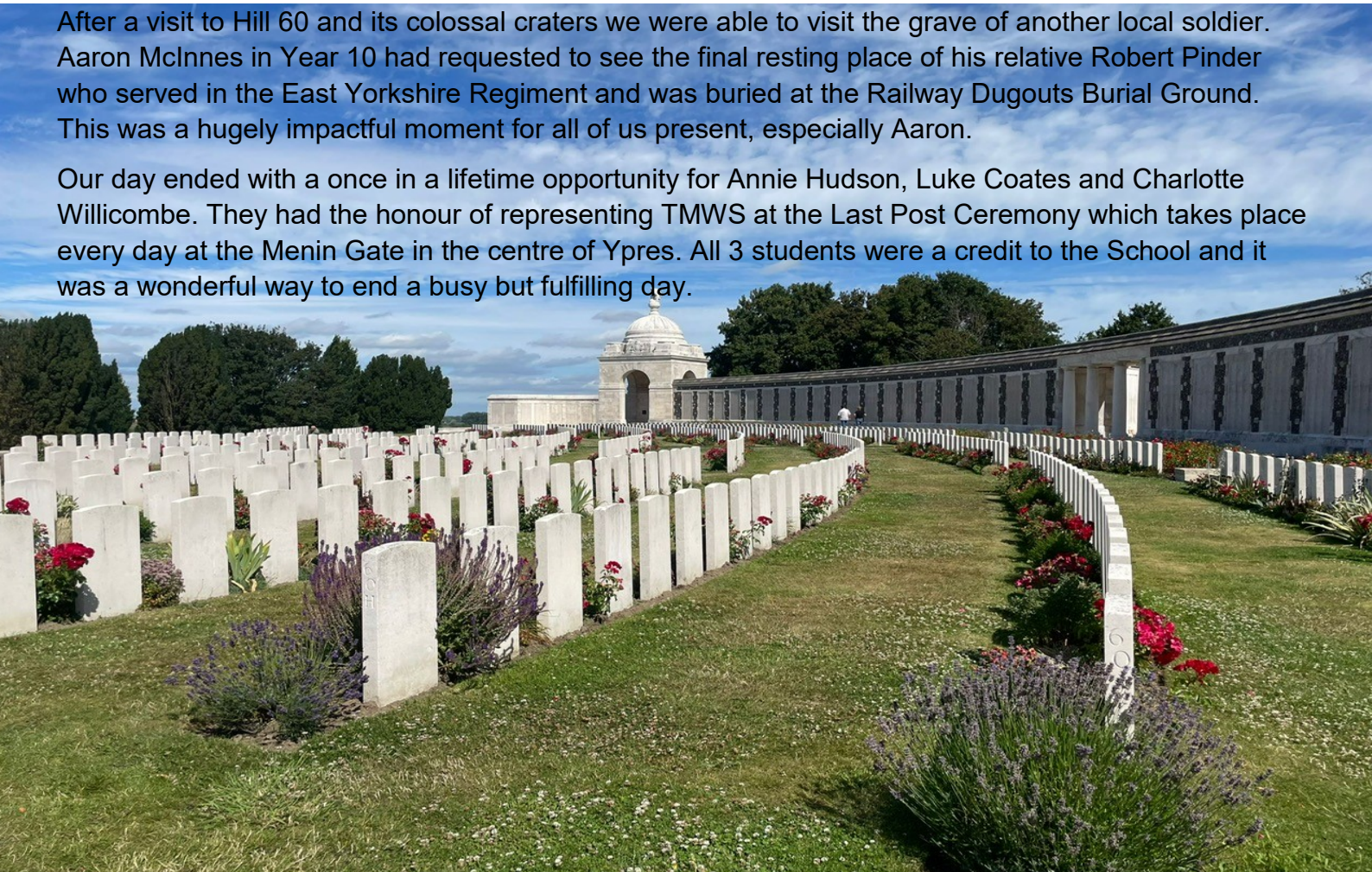
Tuesday was a long but very worthwhile day as we visited some of the most important First World War sites in Flanders. Our day started at St. Julien and the Vancouver Corner Memorial to Canadian soldiers who gave their lives in and around the Ypres Salient; this was of particular poignance to Ms Guilbert! Following this we made the short trip to Langemarck Cemetery which allowed us to compare the approach Germany took to its war dead from the conflict.

Our next site is one that I am sure will leave an indelible impression on our students; Tyne Cot Cemetery. The largest of the Commonwealth War Grave Commission sites, it was a truly astonishing site set on the slopes of Broodseinde Ridge beneath the village of Passchendaele, the rows on rows of immaculately cared for graves were incredibly moving as was the curving walls covered in 33,000 names of soldiers who were never found.

Passchendaele Memorial Museum then gave us an opportunity to get a clearer idea of the experience the soldiers had with a vast array of artefacts, a mock up of the British dugout system alongside British and German trenches.

After a visit to Hill 60 and its colossal craters we were able to visit the grave of another local soldier. Aaron McInnes in Year 10 had requested to see the final resting place of his relative Robert Pinder who served in the East Yorkshire Regiment and was buried at the Railway Dugouts Burial Ground. This was a hugely impactful moment for all of us present, especially Aaron.

Our day ended with a once in a lifetime opportunity for Annie Hudson, Luke Coates and Charlotte Willicombe. They had the honour of representing TMWS at the Last Post Ceremony which takes place every day at the Menin Gate in the centre of Ypres. All 3 students were a credit to the School and it was a wonderful way to end a busy but fulfilling day.





Our final day in Belgium again proved to be eventful. Following another early start and a quick goodbye to our accommodation the first stop was the 50th Northumbrian Division Memorial at Wieltje where we heard the harrowing story of those young men who came through the area in 1915 following the German gas attacks at the Second Battle of Ypres.

Our last museum was at the Hooge Crater which included the opportunity to handle artefacts such as a British Lee Enfield rifle and de-activated shells alongside an exploration of the old front line and No-Mans Land. Finally, our last cemetery visit was further from the front lines around Ypres around the old casualty clearing stations at Lijssenthoek where we saw the grave of Nurse Nellie Spindler, the only British women to die on the Western Front from enemy action.

While we only spent 3 days in Belgium this tour will have a lasting impact on everyone who took part. Visiting areas such as Ypres allows us the opportunity to experience history in a far more immersive way. As ever, our students were brilliant and our guide commented on how much he enjoyed the tour and how impressed he was by the way in which they took the opportunity presented to them.

Education Public Health Advice: Please share with parents and carers

18/07/2023 | Education Public Health

Please can you encourage parents and carers to check their child's red book or vaccination status with their GP.

The local schools' vaccination provider IntraHealth is offering catch-up vaccination sessions through community clinics and the Health and Wellbeing Bus during May half term and throughout the summer holidays.

The free NHS vaccinations offered include:

- 3 in 1 teenage booster (tetanus, diphtheria and polio)
- MenACWY (meningitis and septicemia – both normally given in Year 9 or age 14 – but available up to the age of 25)
- HPV (the first dose for girls and boys is normally given in Year 8 or age 12 to 13 – but both doses are available up to the age of 25).

- Haltemprice Leisure Centre - Tuesday 25 July, 9am to 3.30pm
- Tuesday 8 August, 9am to 3.30pm
- Hornsea Leisure Centre (Hornsea Hub) - Thursday 10 August, 1pm to 3.30pm
- Goole Leisure Centre - Tuesday 1 August, 9.30am to 3pm
- Bridlington Cornerstone Church - Monday 24th July 9.00-3.00pm
- Driffield Children's centre - Friday 28th July 9.00-1.00pm
- Beverley St Nicholas Church hall - Wednesday 2nd August 9.00-3.00pm

All vaccinations are by appointment only, which can be booked via email immunisations.EastRiding@intrahealth.co.uk or by calling IntraHealth 0333 358 3397 (Option 2, then option 1 for East Riding).

Appointments are open to any child attending full-time education up to age 18 in East Riding or Hull, and home-educated children who live in East Riding or Hull.

Those aged 18 to 25 should contact their GP to arrange catch-up NHS vaccinations.

Public health also advises parents and guardians to check their child's red book or with their GP to see if their MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) vaccination is complete. This is particularly important because some teenagers have not had two doses.

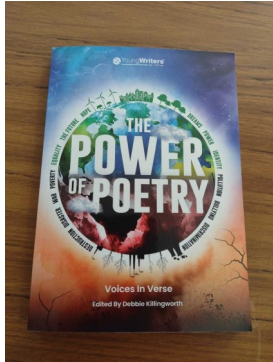


Creative Writing Club—Mrs Bailey

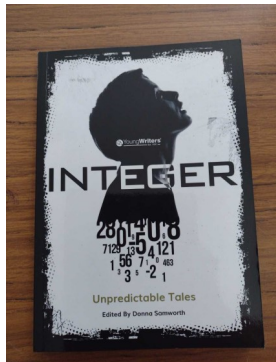

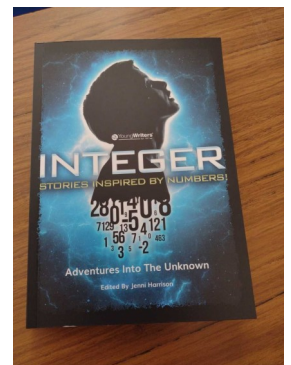

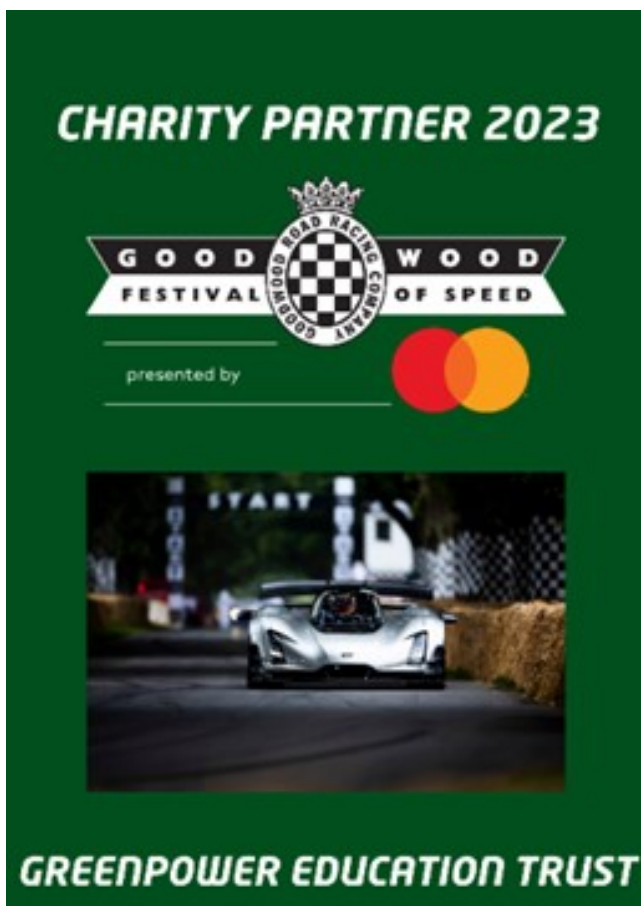

Uniform and equipment

As the summer holidays are upon us and blazers no longer fit or shoes are worn through here are a few key reminders for buying new uniform:

- A tie must be worn every day
- Skirts must be just above the knee and lycra, tight skirts are not permitted
- Shoes must be all black
- School shorts must be tailored fit
- No leggings or jeans

- No nail varnish or acrylic nails

- All students are required to have plastic studded football boots for PE lessons

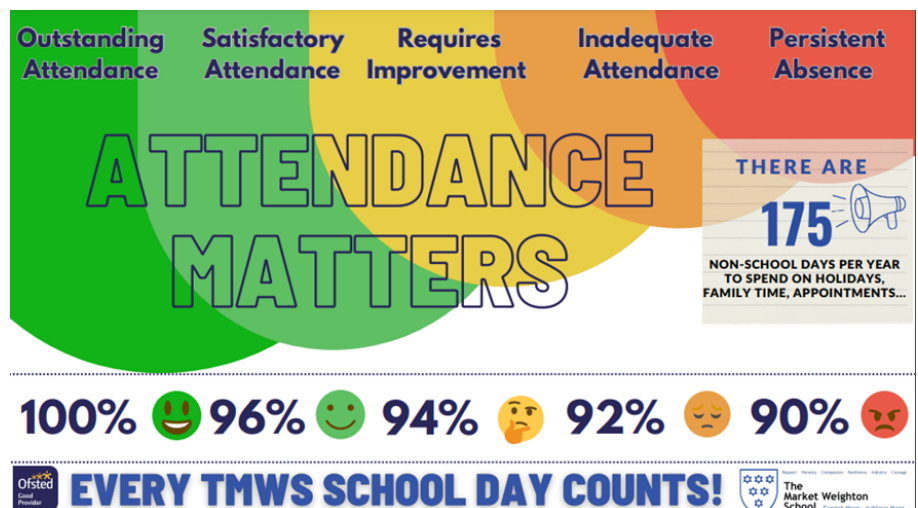

If your child is absent please call through to reception ASAP stating the specific reason for absence.

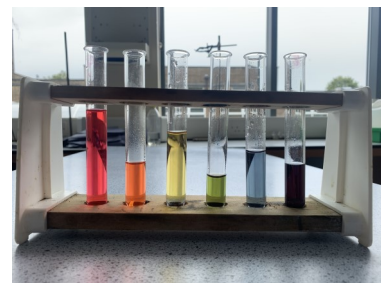


Year 6 Transition Days

Earlier this month we welcomed 132 Year 6 students to TMWS for 3 days of transition activities. An opportunity to meet their Form Tutor and some of their new teachers and experience what learning is like in a secondary school. The favourite lessons of the week are always the practical subjects that they have not experienced before such as science lessons in a lab with Bunsen Burners and chemicals!



Mr Bellerby set the students a challenge of recreating each pH level on the pH scale 0 being strongly acidic, 7 neutral and 14 being strong alkali. The students added a few drops of universal indicator which turns different colours depending where on the pH scale the solution lies - 0 is dark red, 7 is neutral green, 14 being dark blue/purple with colours in between. The students only had 6 test tubes, 1 bottle of 0.1mol Hydrochloric acid (HCl) and 1 bottle of 0.1mol Sodium Hydroxide (NaOH) including 2 pipettes. It required the students to add one drop of either at a time to make it more acidic or alkali to create each of the corresponding colours.

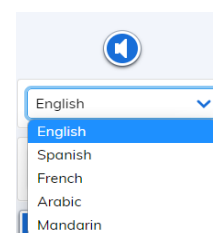

Life: An Exploded Diagram — Mal Peet

This book weaves the stories of three generations alongside events in the wider world. There is Win who must marry to avoid destitution and finds any chance of happiness ruined by the First World War. In later life she becomes a religious fanatic to the shame of daughter Ruth.

Despite Win trying to scare a young Ruth off men her heart is captured by a handsome soldier. They are separated by WWII and on his return George finds it difficult to adjust to life as a husband and father.

Their son, Clem, is the unreliable narrator of the book. We see his family, and world events, through his adolescent eyes. Against the backdrop of the Cuban Missile Crisis he meets the beautiful Frankie, daughter of the local landowner.

The book is full of Norfolk dialect and the realities of life in rural communities. For 13+ readers who would like to get to grips with the impact historical events can have on ordinary people.

Sweatshirts and Jumpers are both available from Price and Buckland on-line or other high street shops and supermarkets.



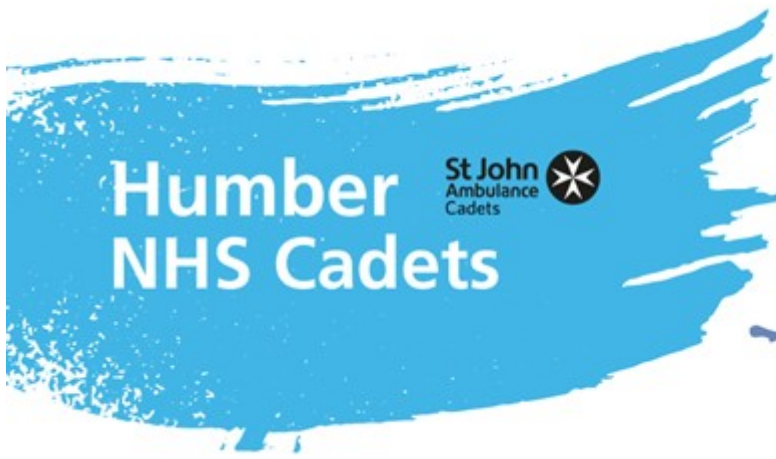

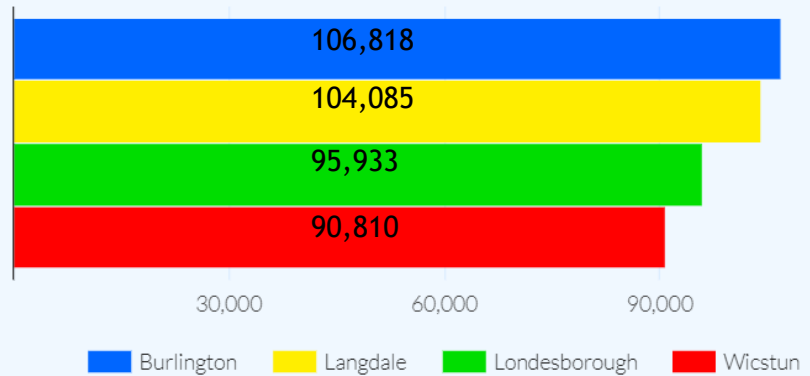
E-praise House Points and Charities

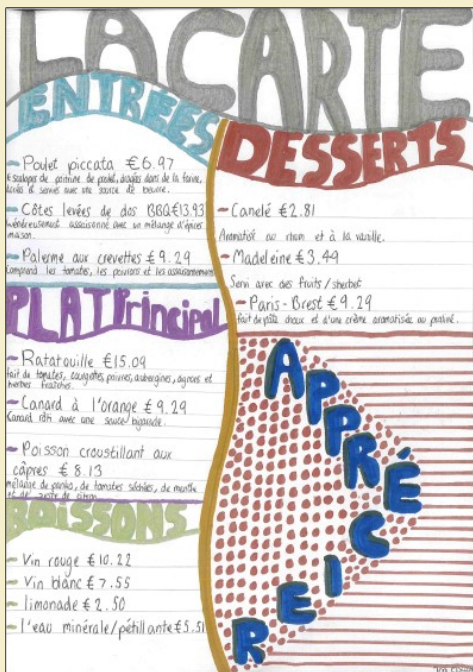

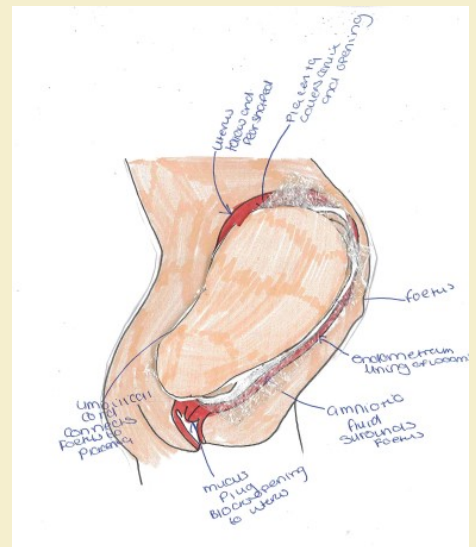
