Headteacher Update

November starts as a month of reflection and remembrance and this year was no exception with many of our students taking part in the Remembrance Sunday parade in Market Weighton and similar events in Holme on Spalding Moor. Our senior students Hallie and Isabelle represented the school in laying a wreath and reading the poem 'The Soldier' by Rupert Brooke. We held a similar service in school beneath our poppy art installation with all Year 7 ad 8 students leading to the 2 minute silence at 11:00am observed by the whole school community.

We were saddened to learn that Rob Couch, a parent and governor of the school passed away suddenly at the start of the month. Rob joined our board of governors in December 2017 when his eldest son Josh joined the school. Rob has been a key member of our resources committee throughout his time as governor bringing experience from his Health and Safety job with ERYC and a passion for inclusion, wellbeing and ensuring all our students are supported when they need it. I am sure you will join me in passing our condolences to Rob's family at what must be a very difficult time.

Towards the end of October we learnt that Ron Powls had passed away. Ron taught English and drama at Market Weighton School for 40 years and was the driving force behind the school productions over many of those years. His memories and photographs were sharded on social media as part of our 70th anniversary celebrations last summer and generated many positive comments and memories for his former pupils. I know many of you who attended TMWS will have fond memories of Mr Powls, clearly a teacher who inspired his pupils and colleagues with his years of dedicated service to education in Market Weighton.

Ron would be so pleased to see big musical productions back as an annual event at TMWS and our students are busy rehearsing for FAME the musical, which will take place in the week before the February half term break. No need to wait that long however as our Year 10 drama students will be performing their version of the pantomime Aladdin on Wednesday 13th December; tickets are available now from reception and Mrs O'Malley in school. Our 9 lessons of Christmas musical showcase will take place on Monday 11th December 2023 in All Saint's Church at 7:00pm, tickets are free but can be reserved on line. I hope to see you at one or both of these events.

We have been awarded East Riding School of the year for our work with Modeshift to encourage sustainable transport along with being the only school in the region to receive the gold stars award. Our team of Active Travel Ambassadors are now planning their project for this year which will be presented to ERYC in March 2024 to win further funding to continue this work. We work in partnership with ERYC Road Safety Team who were in school earlier this month handing out free bike lights to all those who cycle to school. Next week students in Year 7 will have the opportunity to get a free cycle helmet following an assembly on why they should always be worn. Having just had a nasty accident on my bike myself I know how much worse it would have been had I not been wearing a helmet. Please ensure your child is wearing a helmet when cycling to school or are out on their bike. Over the last 2 years we have given away dozens of helmets and have spares for anyone who needs one.

Can I ask that parents who need to collect their children park safely as Spring Road is increasingly busy when our students leave. Can I suggest parking round the corner on Hill Rise and asking your child to walk to you, or perhaps arrive at 3:15pm when all of the taxis will have left leaving the bus parking in front of school available for pick up. Problems are created when lots of cars and the busses are trying to park from 3:00pm. Look North recently publicised parking problems around the infant and junior schools and ERYC will be enforcing parking restrictions outside all schools in the coming weeks.

You will also have received a letter about ensuring we minimise the risk of nuts and food that contains nuts coming into school. We have an increasing number of students with severe nut allergies and need to ensure the school environment is as safe as possible. Thank you for your support with this and all that we do to make TMWS a safe and happy school.



TMWS is now a nut free school.

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a severe reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).





So please may we ask that students have no nut products in lunch boxes or brought into the school as treats.

For example:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Some granola bars
- Cakes that contain nuts
- Biscuits / cookies that contain nuts
- Peanut butter cakes
- Some Asian food, including satay
- Sauces that contain nuts

This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products carefully. We appreciate that this is an additional thing to check and we know that you recognise the importance of it. We do have to insist we are a nut free school. I know if this was your child you would expect that we all help, especially as it is a life-threatening condition.

ERYC FREE SCHOOL MEALS

Despite over a year of high inflation on food costs we have avoided price increases but as prices continue to rise and staff costs also increase we have made some small increases across most of our meals and snacks. We are continuing to offer FREE veg with any meal and will be increasing the Free School Meal allowance to £2.75 to keep pace with these increases. This will be funded by the school as the amount we receive from government remains unchanged at £2:60

Accelerated Reader competition news

In the first half term of the year students have earned 30 certificates for reading.

If you are looking to buy books as Christmas presents here are some recommended reads:

The Highland Falcon Thief—M. G. Leonard & Sam Sedgman

A mystery story set on a train—it's a classic for a reason. In this book, Harrison Beck joins his Uncle Nat for the final journey of the Highland Falcon, Britain's most famous steam train. Nat is there as a travel writer but the other guests are mostly wealthy members of society and royalty. When a jewel thief strikes Harrison will need to work with his new friend Lenny (a stowaway) to solve the mystery and find the culprit.

A great story that should entice train and mystery fans alike. I'm sure it will inspire readers to travel by train to some of the locations mentioned. This is the first in the Adventures on Trains series and there are now several more to enjoy.



Guts—Raina Telgemeier

The third in Raina's graphic novel series based on her experiences of growing up, family and school. This book looks at Raina's struggles with tummy trouble at a time she is increasingly worried about food, school and changing friendships. The topic is dealt with a funny, but thoughtful, way and the artwork is appealing. The graphic novel format means it's more accessible for weaker readers but the content is engaging enough to appeal to readers of all abilities.




Fledgling—Lucy Hope

This is great story for KS3 students looking for a dark, gothic adventure. Cassie lives in a wonderfully unusual house on a hill in a forest. Since her grandfather's death she has taken on the role of looking after the house as her opera singer mother and taxidermist father are often absent and do not love the house like she does. One night there is a violent storm and a cherub flies into her bedroom. The little angel is more birdlike than babylike but Cassie feels a strong protective urge towards it and, in turn, the cherub defends her from the dangerous creatures that begin to appear. Cassie has help from her best friend Raphael but he is also entangled in mystery as history seems tragically bound to repeat itself.



Unbelievable Football—Matt Oldfield

If your child enjoys football you may well have already seen them reading a book by Matt Oldfield. Together with his brother, Tom, he writes many of the Ultimate Football Heroes series which each tell the story of a particular footballer in a brief but engaging way and are amongst the most borrowed books in the library. This book is written in the same style and relates a number of unusual, but true, football stories. It's an interesting read of itself but will be especially appealing to football fans and would be ideal for a more reluctant reader.

Needle—Patrice Lawrence

A short book which contains a powerful message. Charlene has been taken into foster care and away from her little sister, Kandi, who is able to stay with her Dad. Charlene hasn't seen Kandi in 2 years but as the book opens she is busy knitting her a dinosaur blanket. We discover the discrimination she faces in public and in school. When the blanket gets sabotaged Charlene lets her emotions get the better of her and stabs the culprit with her knitting needle. The book follows Charlene as she faces racial bias and the difficulties of the juvenile criminal justice system, without family to support her. Whatever reader's think of her actions it's hard not to empathise with Charlene and the book is excellent at showing the realities of life for some children.




The Blue Book of Nebo—Manon Steffan Ros

It has been 8 years since 'The End.' In an isolated house in Wales, Dylan and his Mum record their thoughts and memories in a found notebook. The reader has to piece together what might have happened to the rest of the world and learns how it has changed these characters. It's a post-apocalyptic story so there is tragedy and a realistic portrayal of events. But the author also weaves a tender tale which questions whether it is the world since 'the End' which is dystopian, or how things were before.



The Screaming Staircase—Jonathan Stroud

This is the first in the Lockwood & Co series and is part thriller, part horror with an engaging group of characters. The premise is that something has changed and ghosts are now a disturbingly common problem. Children are the only ones sensitive enough to detect the ghosts and therefore be able to deal with them. Agencies have sprung up around the country, run by adults with child employees. Lockwood & Co is different as it is run and staffed by teenagers. The interactions with the spectres are satisfyingly scary and the exposition of the rules showcases the thought the author has put into worldbuilding. In combination with the witty dialogue it makes a book that's well worth a read.



Life on the Refrigerator Door—Alice Kuipers

With the hectic pace of modern life it can be easy to miss out on time with family as everyone rushes to and fro. In this book we learn about the life and relationship of 15 year old Claire and her Mum as they communicate by notes on the refrigerator door. It begins with shopping list requests and plans for a night in together. However, after the Mum finds a lump in her breast the notes chart the different ways the characters approach the difficulties they face. They have the best of intentions to spend time together but other commitments get in the way. The note format makes it a quick read, but the message about the importance of making time for people in your life will stay with you.








E-praise Points November 2023







Wall of Excellence - Rewarding 'Industry'






































#TeamTMWS Christmas Appeal for Peoples Pantry 2023 Thinking of others at Christmas
