Headteacher Update

Firstly I would like to welcome all our new Year 6 parents to our monthly newsletter. March is the month parents of Year 6 students find out if they have got the secondary school place of choice and it is good to see more parents making a positive choice to send their children to TMWS. We are expecting 127 students to join us in Year 7 in September and are looking forward to meeting new students and parents during our transition days which will take place from Tuesday 2nd to Thursday 4th July this year. As a school we continue to grow and this gives us a secure financial basis on which to continue to invest in our buildings and facilities.

Thank you to all who took the time to respond to our consultation on forming a multi-academy Trust along with other local schools. Although the formal consultation has closed we are still keen to hear your views or answer any questions you may have. If you are in school please do collect a consultation brochure and take the opportunity to ask any questions. Following the consultation, due diligence and scrutiny of plans for financial control and governance, our governors have voted unanimously to make a resolution to convert to academy status and join the proposed new trust. We are now looking to submit applications to the Department for Education in April for their scrutiny and a decision, hopefully before the end of the summer term. This will give us several months to make further detailed plans and deal with all the legal aspects before conversion after January 2025. This is a long term project that will take time to get right. We are excited about the opportunities that this new trust could create and believe it will continue to improve the quality of education in Market Weighton.

Thank you too for all the responses to our annual parent questionnaire. We analyze all the answers, compare with previous years and read all the free text responses. Positive feedback is always great to read but the suggestions on how we can improve are the most valuable as we take all these into account when planning future provision and although we may not be able to make all the changes suggested we always reflect on what we can do better.

Each month we are adding more updates to our Newsletter on different aspects of our provision in school and a selection of the activities and events that have taken place that month. We post regularly on Facebook and X (Twitter) about the many events and trips that are taking place every week, please do follow us if you are not already. This is a great way for parents of Year 6 students to find out more about what is happening in school every week. In this edition you can read how we marked National Careers Week and read how a group of Year 9 students experienced a week in a school in France. The PE department have been busy completing the final football fixtures of the season, competing in end of season netball tournaments and our basketball teams have been enjoying success. Our long awaited ski trip leaves for Italy on Friday and we are looking forward to Duke of Edinburgh expeditions and a Year 8 residential outdoor activity trip next term.

Exchange visit to France

Earlier this month 6 Year 9 students visited France to stay with families and experience education in our link school in Cazeres near Toulouse. The students stayed with families and attended school each day attending PE, IT, science and English lessons. Mrs Guilbert was able to get involved too, teaching some English lessons. The students have Wednesday afternoons off to take part in activities but other days don't finish until 5:00pm! They sampled school dinners and were impressed with just how clean and well looked after the school was. They were particularly impressed with the quality of the PE facilities including their own climbing wall! The students were also taken out and about the local area visiting an aircraft museum and spent time in Toulouse, a town near the Pyrenees mountains. Most schools in France do not have a school uniform so our students wore their uniform one day and some of the class wore what they thought an English school uniform would be. Interestingly the school is considering introducing a uniform and were keen to hear the views of students. The French students will be making a return visit to TMWS in June. It will be interesting to find out what they think about our school and the local area.




Adverse Childhood

Many young people may need to access external services at some stage of their educational career if they are experiencing difficulties in health, education, social care sectors. We have a vast, highly qualified team that are willing to support your child and because of our inclusive ethos we have found ourselves experiencing a high volume of referral requests. This also includes ADHD and Autism referrals, speech and language service requests and requests relating to Dyspraxia tendencies.

We ask to support this process that parents/ carers begin an information gathering process to enable our decision making on whether a referral is an appropriate route for your child. Once stages 1-5 have been completed, internal staff begin their 5 stage approach. You will be included in decision making processes if your child requires this level of external support at The Market Weighton School.

Careers Education Update

National Apprenticeship Week

During the week beginning Monday 5th February we supported National Apprenticeship Week in school. Form tutors shared the National Apprenticeship Week assembly outlining all details of what Apprenticeships are and how they work. We then followed this up with quizzes to see how much information pupils had taken in. Moving forward the school will continue to ensure all pupils in Years 8-11 have access to quality information from training providers which highlight the range of opportunities available via Apprenticeships and Technical Qualifications.

National Careers Week

During the week beginning Monday 4th March we supported National Careers Week in school. Form Tutors and teaching staff spoke to pupils about their pathways into their careers and adapted lessons to cover careers related activity. We were very fortunate to have guest speakers in school every morning from businesses in the Hull and East Riding area to speak with our Year 9 pupils. Our speakers gave information about their organisations and the various roles within and also how they themselves had arrived at their chosen careers. Careers Education Student Voice

As part of the school's desire to increase student voice to improve our careers education offer Year 10 pupils Emily Richardson and Emma Young have been part of the careers student voice network for the HEY LEP (Hull and East Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership). Both pupils attended a series of meetings both in person and online to discuss current issues in the careers and business market around the region. This culminated in Emily and Emma delivering a presentation to pupils and staff from other schools in the area and also business people and key officials at a busy Hull Guildhall. The recommendations for improvements flagged by the pupils will form part of a report to improve careers education content and delivery in our school and across the area.







Careers Guidance

After a number of years providing the school with quality careers guidance to our pupils Sue Tunstall (Purple Patch Careers) has retired from her role at the school. Our thanks go to Sue for her hard work and dedication over the years and we wish her well in her retirement.

I am very pleased to announce that we have Jenny Dale (from GP Careers Consultants) joining us after Easter. Jenny will provide Careers Guidance interviews in school each Tuesday following a schedule to ensure every pupil gets at least one interview in their time at the school. Jenny will also offer



a lunchtime drop-in service as required for pupils.

PD Day 3 - Careers Content

On PD Day 3 (Thursday 25 April 2024) we will continue to deliver our careers content with our Year 10 Mock Interviews with Employers taking place in the school Hall. Every Year 10 pupil will be interviewed by one of 15 companies who have agreed to take part. I have asked pupils to prepare for a 20-minute interview by thinking about their answers to a series of questions I have e-praised messaged to pupils and parents. This will be followed by feedback from the employer. This is a supportive process designed to help pupils gain confidence in the interview situation. When not being interviewed Year 10 pupils will work around a series of presentations from different post-16 providers in the area. The idea being that after our Progression Event in October 2024 pupils will apply to post-16 providers before Christmas 2024.

Year 9 will also receive a workshop from the LOMO (Log on, move on) team. Each pupil will have access to their own log in on the platform from which they can build a profile and search for everything careers based in the area.

Big Thanks for fundraising efforts

Together we raised £781 for Comic Relief by wearing non-uniform and buying donated cakes at break. Red Nose Day also saw the annual staff vs student netball match take place, with the staff taking the win despite an injured Mrs Townend having to sit this one out!



GUIDANCE AT A GLANCE

Measles

Humber Teaching NHS Foundation Trust

Measles is known to be a highly infectious acute viral disease resulting from infection with the measles virus.
Measles is transmitted via respiratory droplets, or direct contact with nasal/throat secretions of infected individuals.
Incubation period ranges between 7 to 18 days (mean 10 to 12 days).
Any staff member exposed to an individual suspected or confirmed to have measles please contact Occupational Health 01482 389333 for a review of your immunity and to discuss the risks.
Any unvaccinated staff member exposed to measles would be considered a contact having had face to face contact of more than 15 minutes in a confined area e.g., in the same room. The staff member should be excluded from work from the 5th day after the

first exposure to 21 days after the final exposure unless they have satisfactory evidence

of protection (positive IgG antibody test result or two doses of the MMR vaccine).
Any suspected cases must be excluded from school, nursery, or work for 4 days after the onset of rash.

Symptoms

KEY POINTS

Initial symptoms include:

- Fever
- · Sore/red/watery eyes / conjunctivitis
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Sneezing
- Aching and feeling generally unwell

Small grey / white spots, called Koplik's spots, appear on the inside of the mouth 1 to 2 days before rash onset and may last for 2 to 4 days

A red / brown rash (blotchy) is then seen to develop 2 to 4 days after the onset of fever and spreading from the head to the body.

IPC Precautions

- A risk assessment is required prior to any individual entering the patient's room / delivering direct clinical care i.e., staff vaccination status must be considered.
- Essential clinical interventions only to be undertaken during the patient's infectious period to minimise the contact risk.
- Both standard (SICPs) and Airborne transmission precautions should be followed to reduce transmission via the respiratory route.
- In accordance with the <u>National IPC Manual</u> a FFP3 mask or Powered Air Purifying Respirator (PAPR) Hoods will be required.
- An enhanced level of cleaning should be adopted in all rooms the patient(s) has accessed prior to diagnosis and apply to the isolation room.

The IPC team to be informed in working hours 01482 389232. Out of hours the Infection Control Doctor to be informed <u>contact details</u>.

All suspected measles cases to be promptly notified to the local Health Protection Team by clinician on 0113 386 0300 during working hours and out of hours on 0151 909 1219.

- Who is at risk? People in certain atrisk groups including
- Babies,
- Young children,
- Pregnant women,
 - People with weakened immunity,

are at increased risk of complications from measles.

Suspected / Confirmed Measles

- Isolate the patient within a single room as per <u>National IPC A-Z Pathogen Resource.</u>
- Individuals are typically infectious 5 days before and up to 4 days after rash onset.
- Inform the IPC Team
- Obtain a medical review:
- To confirm diagnosis, a buccal swab is required and is to be sent for Measles PCR using a COPAN E-swab (pink top).

Hand & Respiratory Hygiene

Maintaining good hand and respiratory hygiene is imperative to reducing the spread of measles.

- Hands should be decontaminated on entry and exit from an isolation room as well as before and after patient contact
- Use a tissue to cover the mouth and nose when coughing / sneezing
- Dispose the tissue in the nearest waste receptacle after use

Prevention – Vaccination

- MMR is part of the NHS Routine Childhood Immunisation Programme. Children should receive 2 doses before the age of 4 years.
- All individuals who have not previously been vaccinated are eligible for the MMR vaccine and are urged to come forward.



Think measles!

Vaccination rates have fallen, and cases of measles are increasing in England. Any patient with fever and a rash is potentially infectious and should be directed to a side room on arrival.

Isolate anyone presenting with a rash and fever straight away



measles starts with a 2 to 4 day "prodromal" phase before the rash appears, with coryza, cough, conjunctivitis and a fever fever twoically increases, to peak around rash onset

rand generally starts behind the ears, spreads to the face and then expands onto the trunk and can become generalised. The reach is red, blotchy, maculopapular (not lichy) and lasts around 3 to 7 days – the reach is more difficult to spot on dark

skin (see images 3, 4 and 5) Koplik spots may appear around the time of the

- resh and last for 2 to 3 days so can easily be missed. They are small white or bluish/white lesions on the buccal mucosa. They can be confused with other lesions in the mouth and so their suspected presence is an unreliable marker of measles
- the infectious period spans 8 days i.e. cases are infectious from 4 days before rash onset and for 4 full days after

several other common rash illnesses have similar presentations (especially in young children) e.g. roseola, parvovirus infection and scartet fever, and so identification on dinical features alone may be unreliable If you suspect measles call your local UKHSA Health Protection Team (HPT) to notify and conduct a risk assessment

- if the patient is calling, advise them to seek medical advice from their GP over the phone or NHS 111, if this is appropriate
- if an in-person review is needed, reception staff should be alerted. The patient should be directed to a side room on arrival

 report to local HPT urgently by phone to facilitate prompt risk assessment and public health action for vulnerable contacts (under 1 year olds, pregnant, immunocompromised).





The E-praise Reward Scheme

Extra-Curricular Enrichment


Examples of enrichment activities which may be offered to students during their time at TMWS include:

Wall of Excellence - Rewarding 'Industry'


